Why Do We Witness?: Jonah 4:1-11

It's amazing what you miss when you keep your eyes closed. Have you ever failed to see people the way that God sees them? It happened to Jonah.

The chapters in Jonah's story could be entitled:

- 1. Jonah runs from God.
- 2. Jonah runs into God.
- 3. Jonah runs behind God.
- 4. Jonah runs with God?

Jonah Needed to See Outsiders Differently.

• The Israelites hated the Ninevites. "You can safely assume you've created God in your own image when it turns out that God hates all the same people you do." (Anne Lamott) To be honest, the Ninevites were pretty bad dudes...

Exodus 34:6; John 3:16; Numbers 14:18; Nehemiah 9:17; Psalm 86:15; 103:8; 145:8; Joel 2:13; Nahum 1:3

• If we see people like God does, we will have a heart for the mission field. "If you don't give to missions, you won't go to hell. But someone else might." (Wayne Smith) But you also have a heart for YOUR mission field.

2. Jonah Needed to See Himself Differently.

- Someone said ingratitude comes from "counting someone else's blessings instead of your own." Jonah was angry at the Ninevites' salvation because he truly wasn't grateful for his own salvation.
- This missionary assignment isn't about the hardness of the Ninevites' hearts. It's about the hardness of Jonah's
 heart. The irony is that God is having a harder time saving <u>Jonah</u> than He did saving <u>Ninevah</u>. "I really only love
 God as much as I love the person I love the least." (Dorothy Day)
- You won't extend grace widely if you don't experience grace deeply. Only when you realize that you are a great sinner will you proclaim a great <u>Savior</u>.

- 1. Jonah didn't care for the people of Nineveh. Who do you struggle with being willing to reach?
- 2. What do you think was Jonah's biggest problem? Prejudice? Burnout? Anger? Pride? Jealousy? Other?
- 3. In what ways are you sometimes more concerned about petty things than about those under God's judgement?
- 4. If ingratitude comes from "counting someone else's blessings instead of your own," how can you give thanks to God for showing mercy to you?
- 5. What can you do to begin to see people the way God sees them?
